

#### SAINT of the MONTH of NOVEMBER

Blessed Maria Fortunata Viti (1827 –1922) was born in Italy, the eldest daughter of nine children. Her father had a gambling and alcohol addiction, and her mother died when she was 14 years old.

Maria then cared for her younger siblings and worked as a housekeeper to earn money for the family as her father sunk deeper into his addiction. Maria rejected an offer for marriage, deciding instead to become a Benedictine nun at the age of 24.

Sr. Maria Fortunata, illiterate her entire life, spent more than seventy years in the monastery as a housekeeper attending to the washing,

#### sewing, and other simple tasks, which was her path to holiness.

She was admired for her great simplicity of heart, and her confessor testified that she was often accosted by the devil with threats, physical attacks, and vile insults in attempts to break her virtue. She had great devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and made frequent visits to the chapel tabernacle as she carried out her daily tasks.

She died at the age of 95, and after her death miracles were reported at her grave.

She is a patron saint against poverty, temptations, loss of parents, and mental illness.



#### St. Winebald (701-761 A.D.) Feast Day December 18

**A**lso known as Winibald or Wynbald - a Sax-




on prince born into a holy and royal family in England. **His father, St. Richard the King, and his mother, St. Wunna of Wessex, are both saints, as well as his brother, St. Willibald, his sister, St. Walburga, and his uncle, St. Boniface.** 

After making a pilgrimage to the Holy Land with his father and brother, and then spending many years in Rome, Winebald was recruited by his uncle, Boniface, to join him in evangelizing Germany.

Winebald was ordained a priest and worked as a missionary across Germany, Holland, France, Austria, Belgium, and Luxembourg, leaving behind many flourishing churches and monasteries under the Rule of St. Benedict. St. Winebald was an important figure in laying the foundations of Christianity across much of Europe.

After his death, his tomb became a pilgrimage shrine.

#### St. Zeno of Nicomedia

(d. 303 A.D.) was a Roman soldier and commander

living in Nicomedia (modern-day Turkey) during the reign of Roman Emperors Diocletian and Maximian.

During their fierce persecution of the Church they were

condemning many Christians to death, including any soldiers who professed faith in Jesus Christ. In Nicomedia alone, as many as 20,000 Christians were burned alive as they gathered inside a cathedral on Christmas Day.

Standing nearby when the Emperor was offering a sacrifice to a Roman deity, St. Zeno, a Christian, mocked his devotion to a soulless god. St. Zeno was immediately seized and put to death, giving him a martyr's crown. St. Zeno's feast day is December 22nd.
